"Despite a very windy start to the week and the uncertainty of the outcome of the General Election, we opened the Marquee doors last Friday at 11am with Lord Egremont kindly performing the official opening, cutting the ribbon in front of a waiting audience," said Ingrid Nilson, Director of organisers The Antiques Dealers Fair Limited. "We were thrilled to welcome numerous visitors from Sussex and further afield, even as far as Northumberland, many of whom were keen to buy. As the day unfolded and the results of the General Election became known both exhibitors and visitors were in high spirits and one guest was overheard saying he had come to spend his mansion tax! We were delighted to learn that Petworth House itself benefitted, with many visitors taking advantage of the free entry to the magnificent National Trust property with our tickets and that the collaboration with the Petworth Business Association (PBA) resulted in increased footfall in the picturesque market town, a well-known centre for antiques."

The atmosphere throughout the weekend for the inaugural Petworth Park Antiques & Fine Art Fair was very upbeat, with both visitors and dealers

In the first hour alone, there were considerable sales, including a Noah's ark with over 100 animals (Melody Antiques), a Canterbury (Tim Saltwell), a silver nutmeg grater (Mary Cooke Antiques), jewellery (T Robert), glass (John Bird Antiques), a painting (Sarah Colegrave) and two 19th century bronze sculptures (Garret & Hurst Sculpture).

Sales continued across the board throughout the three days. **Olde Time** sold 12 clocks and barometers within the £7,000 bracket. Paul Nunn reported, "A very good fair, one of the best fairs we have done for a long time. We have sold mainly to new customers, including two bracket clocks (£5,000-7,000), a very rare air flow meter, c1890, and a theodolite made by E R Watts, London along with its original leather travelling case, c1870. All but two of our sales were to a new set of younger customers". Local dealer, Elspeth Bray of Moncrieff-Bray Gallery was very upbeat saying she brought in an Adam Binder leopard sculpture on the Sunday morning and it sold for £9,500 an hour later. Good quality 18th century brown furniture were finding new homes with Freshfords Fine Antiques selling a Hepplewhite Serpentine chest of drawers and Guy Dennler Antiques & Interiors selling a Regency mahogany sofa table in the region of £5,850 amongst many other pieces. Melody Antiques reported excellent sales over the three days including three dressers. William Cook sold a walnut chest for around £5,000 to a new customer, who had driven from London to visit the fair. Sussex dealer, Tim Saltwell sold 19th century English and French furniture as well as decorative items.

Among the sales at **The Canon Gallery** was a Burne-Jones painting in the region of £20,000. "The fair brought people in who wouldn't go to a London fair" said Jeremy Green of **The Canon Gallery**. **The Jerram Gallery** had an excellent response selling a good number of paintings and sculpture by contemporary artists including 'Kestrel' by Paul Harvey, priced at £8,650. **Rountree Tryon Galleries Ltd** sold a large canvas by Emily Lamb. Their stand included a small selection of classical antiquities which fascinated visitors and resulted in a couple of sales of two ancient Egyptian pieces and early European jewellery. Chantelle Rountree remarked, "It was an excellent launch pad; our first time bringing antiquities to a fair." **Drove House Antiques** sold a good selection of Chinese porcelain to new customers from Sussex, Surrey and London as well as a Chinese textile. Petworth dealer, **John Bird Antiques** sold a wide variety of objects including upholstered pieces, glass and affordable paintings. Glass dealer, **Mark J West** reported good sales in the 'impulse-buying bracket'.

Ian Pearce, Events Manager at Petworth House said, "We could not be more pleased with the successful launch of this new event. Ingrid Nilson and her team have been a delight to work with, bringing a highly polished finish to everything they touch. The event has attracted so many new visitors to Petworth and this can only be a good thing!"

Alex Rees, Chair of the Petworth Business Association (PBA) said: "The inaugural (we hope!) Petworth Park Antiques & Fine Arts Fair last weekend was yet another high class event taking place on our doorstep here in the South Downs National Park. Petworth Park itself made a sublime setting for a well organised showcase of antique furniture, paintings, clocks, silver, jewellery and textiles, and the fair and town was busy with buyers over the whole weekend. The organisers and Petworth Business Association
